

## **Itteringham**

#### **Church Services in Itteringham this month:**

The Easter Sunday Service will include egg decorating, an egg hunt and a quiz and lots of chocolate, for adults as well as children. We do hope you can come.

#### **Norfolk Wildlife Trust Churchyard Conservation Scheme**

The Scheme was established in 1981 to encourage management of churchyards with wildlife in mind. Geoff, Saffron and I met Lucy Seely, wildlife and community officer, at the NWT to discuss the survey. The surveys of Itteringham Churchyard were carried out in April, June and September 2022 and I have placed a copy of the survey form on the church notice board in the porch. (If anyone would like a copy please say and I will email it). The churchyard supports some nice wildflowers including Bur-



net saxifrage and pignut – both are churchyard dependent species and so rely on church grassland for their survival in Norfolk. Pignut flowers quite early in May to June and can be mistaken for cow parsley which is in flower at the same time. Burnet saxifrage flowers quite late in the summer and also looks a bit like cow parsley. We have roped off two small areas in the churchyard to allow these areas to grow for a longer period in the spring and summer, one for the burnet saxifrage just south of the church (which will be cut in September) and the other for pignut in the east of the churchyard (which will be cut in July). We have also roped off a small wildlife refuge strip at the rear of the churchyard which will be left to grow tall along the boundary. This will act as a shelter and habitat to small animals. The strip will be cut down in October. We will be having an exhibition in the Church for the May Fayre and Open Gardens and hope someone from NWT will be able to come along and talk about the Scheme and our survey. Many thanks to Geoff and Saffron for their help and enthusiasm.

**Quiz night** - everyone very much enjoyed the Quiz night at the Village Hall in aid of Church funds. It was a great turnout and we raised just over £245 for church funds. Many congratulations to the winning team – the "Cheezy Whats Its". And many thanks to Henry, Laurel and Grace for organising and doing the food.


Please bring glasses (the drinking type), whatever you like to put in them and a plate, dish, knife, fork, and spoon (saves on the washing up).


## Welcome to Little Barningham's April village page.

## Children's pages

### **Easy DIY bird feeder**

Treat the birds this Easter with this easy craft idea. As spring is here it's great watching the garden birds as they perch on the side, pecking away at the seed. It's a great way to learn about local wildlife and enjoy a fun afternoon of craft.



## To make an Easter bird feeder, you will need:

- 1 large orange
- 2 kebab skewers
- Bird seed
- String

#### What to do

- 1. Cut a large orange in half and scoop out the middle (you can eat this as a snack).
- 2. Poke a kebab skewer through one side of the orange and out through the other, then poke another kebab skewer through from the other side so the two skewers make a cross in the middle. Little birds can perch on these skewers while they eat the seed.
- 3. Take two equal lengths of string and tie these onto the skewers on either side so you can hang it up. It might not balance with just one, so be sure to do both.
- 4. Fill the orange with bird seed, then hang on a branch for the birds to enjoy.

## Gardening

Finally, it feels like Spring has sprung as our gardens, woodland and roadside verges are bursting into leaf and bloom.

However, not all plants in the garden are greening up, there have been a few casualties this winter.

Hebe, Euphorbia, Rosemary and Penstemon have noticeably suffered, even in sheltered gardens. These plants are generally considered to be tough enough to survive winter temperatures in this region. I suspect the extreme temperatures of last summer, followed by continued mild weather and then sudden prolonged hard frosts in December, just put too much stress on the plants to survive. I've not given up on them as there's a chance they may start sprouting further down the plant. Some Penstemon are certainly now sprouting around the stem base.



Going forward, to grow these heat loving Mediterranean plants, we need to ensure we provide sufficient drainage for them when planting. This will prevent them sitting in cold damp soils in the winter, which they really do not appreciate.

Things to do this month

- Sow seeds undercover and directly where they are to grow.
- Make a plan to visit some gardens for inspiration while supporting organisations such as the National Garden Scheme, St John Ambulance and village fundraisers. Itteringham Village open gardens is returning this year, on Sunday 18th June.

If you are as old and grumpy as me, you'll probably be appalled and mystified by the illustration here. It's by Nicholas Markell, a modern American artist, and is the final one of the fifteen pictures that describe The Stations of the Cross.

Markell's illustration contains all the elements of The Resurrection with which we may be familiar: the rock, the empty cross, an angel (or is it The Risen Christ?), and rays of light streaming from the tomb. There is a hard edge to the work: all those straight lines which, to me, hint at power and might. I like that. There is little here that is soft and gentle. That suggests that The Resurrection happened. A fact.

For many of us, we are so familiar with the story of The Resurrection of Jesus that we take it for granted. Gentle paintings of Christ, bathed in Holy Land sunshine, a lush garden, craggy rocks: such may not move us, so Markell gives us the opportunity to consider the over-powering effect of The Resurrection anew. To consider again, afresh, that Jesus, truly and really, overcame death, and did what God his Father said he'd do: Rise Again.

And in that, we base our faith, our hope, our eternal life. Alleluia!

In St. Andrew's church, Little Barningham, there are more traditional depictions of The Stations of the Cross.

#### Nature Notes from Libby Keen at Mannington.

This is the last contribution from Libby as she moves to a new role at Pensthorpe. Libby has been at Mannington for seven years as assistant and Conservation officer and as well as her usual duties developing the children's garden and Enchanted trail.

## WHAT TO SEE ON YOUR WALK

#### **Yellow Flowers:**



This time of the year most of the flowers that you will see are yellow.

Examples are lesser celandines, daffodils, gorse and primrose.

If you walk through our wet woodland (the Cut), you will notice along the path there are many primroses already in flower.

#### **Birds Breeding:**

Birds are getting busy checking out possible nest sites and collecting nest materials. Keep an eye on nest boxes.

#### **Hedges Flowering:**

Cherry plum is the first to flower with its pretty white flowers. Soon after, Blackthorn and then Hawthorn will flower.

#### **Boxing Hares:**

Hares can be seen chasing and boxing one another as the breeding season has started. Male hares pursue females in order to mate, however this annoys the female hares making them fight back and a scrap often occurs.



#### Frog and Toad Spawn:



When we get a warm wet night, the amphibians will be on the move to find areas to breed. Check ponds, lakes and even big puddles for spawn.

Frogs tend to breed earlier than toads, but it is easy to tell the difference between the two spawns. Frogs spawn their eggs in clumps whereas toads spawn strings of eggs.

#### **Migrants Leaving and Arriving:**

Winter migrants are beginning to leave. Thrushes such as Redwings and Fieldfares will start their long journey across into areas of Europe.

On the other hand, summer migrants will be arriving soon. Listen out for Chiffchaffs in the next couple of weeks.

#### Nature notes from Itteringham Mill

Hints of spring abound through seeing blooms of narcissi, daffodils, purple crocus, aconite and, trees in blossom. I heard and saw a lark singing high in the sky above a beet field, a pair of pigeons seeing off a large flock of siskin thinking of settling in the nesting trees of the pigeon and a pair of cock pheasants considering fighting but choosing to peck for food instead. The garden birds are filling up on fat and peanuts from the feeders and judging from the way they fly as pairs between the bushes and over the river, they seem to be engaging in some courting behaviour. The swans arrive nearly every day and feed and groom together but they are not yet displaying courting behaviour. Rather to my despair but a pleasure to see, a pair of muntjak are daily visitors to the garden, eating away at new foliage, the male scenting the shrubs as he sniffs and pokes around the leaf litter and later, the female arriving follows those markings.

Powerful winds of the 13th March brought down trees in many places around Itteringham and we all experienced a one-two hour power cut in late afternoon into early evening. The power cuts as displayed on PowerGen's area map showed multiple areas of Norfolk being affected. The wind itself felt unexpectedly warm. March as personified, seems to be battling with indecision as to whether to remain in winter cold, even to give us snow, move to April-type showers or winter downpours or whether to provide us with glorious sunshine. The gardens must welcome the wet after such a dry 2022.

#### THE FALL OF SINGAPORE AND THE THAI/BURMA RAILWAY

The continuing story of the time Fred Hoskins spent as a prisoner of war of the Japanese, written in 1992 and told in his own words.

Clothing had virtually vanished, most men now wearing only a 'Jap Happy' - a piece of cloth tied with a lace around their loins. No evidence of rank was visible, so it was proposed by Captain P that I claimed for more warrant officers and sergeants than was actually the case. The extra money then went into a welfare fund and I was given an extra dollar every ten days for my trouble! The risk was of course a serious one if the Japanese found out. One evening, I felt an irresistible urge to put in the true details of ranks.

The next morning, my working parties were stopped at the guard room and checked, the warrant officers and sergeants being separated from the privates. My return was of course correct, and an urgent warning was flashed around the camp to other huts to observe caution in the future.

We had to salute all Japanese or Koreans unless we were not wearing a hat, in which case, we had to bow. The man leading a working party past the guard room had to give the command 'Kashira Hidari' or 'Kashira Migi' - eyes left or right as the case might be, followed by 'Nore' (pronounced noray) - eyes front. Fai lure to do so meant being halted and beaten. One man forgetting the command for eyes front and fearing reprisals, gave the command 'Eyes back again!'

We now found we had another problem - body lice. Regularly on the occasions of 'yasume' we would boil such clothing and blankets as we had, for a minimum of twenty minutes and this way we kept it under control. The clothing etc. quickly dried in the heat of the sun.

Flies too, were an abomination. There were so many of them. Working on the railway often resulted in skin damage to arms and legs, and dozens of flies would be attracted to the sore places. Dreadful ulcers then developed, the flesh melting away and leaving the bone exposed. The only treatment then was for the arm or leg to be amputated. In one hut there were about two hundred men with amputated limbs and the stench was sickening. We were able to buy small round patches of paper with tar on them which if applied to the damaged area immediately, kept the flies off and reduced the risk of infection.

Our boots had worn out and we were given one-piece wooden clogs which had a toe-strap made of old bicycle tyre. While walking with these, I kicked one against my shin. A small ulcer developed but by treating it with neat carbolic acid it slowly went. Most men went around with the purple scars of healed ulcers.......

Due to the uncertainty of the future of the CCN, I cannot promise another episode of Fred's time as a prisoner of the Japanese.

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
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
